Dental Hygiene is a Hot Job in Michigan

People who work in the field of dental hygiene spend every day caring for others and empowering patients to care for their own oral health. Good oral health is not just about having a good-looking smile—it also is a key component of a person's overall health. People working in dentistry know that they help make people healthier and more confident each day.

To succeed in this field, you must enjoy working closely with patients to assess their oral tissues and overall health. You must also be an effective communicator, explaining procedures to patients as well as sharing important information with the other dental professionals in the office.

Cool Classes You Can Take

Dental hygiene isn't only about caring for a patient's oral health. There are some cool, unexpected classes you can choose as you pursue this path, such as:

Anatomy of the Head and Neck

It's not all about teeth! This class teaches students about the ways the head and neck are tied to good oral health. Hygienists who understand the function and normal anatomy of the head and neck are able to recognize abnormalities that can affect a person's eating, speaking, and facial expression. These abnormalities impact dental hygiene, treatment plans, and many aspects of a patient's life.

Pharmacology

This course is a study of medications with special emphasis given to those used in the dental office. Students learn the origin of these drugs, their basic physical and chemical properties, methods of administration, and their effects upon the body systems.

Financial Help

There are many federal grants, work-study funds, and low-interest loans available to help students cover the costs of tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, transportation, and other college-related expenses. The first step in securing necessary financial aid is to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

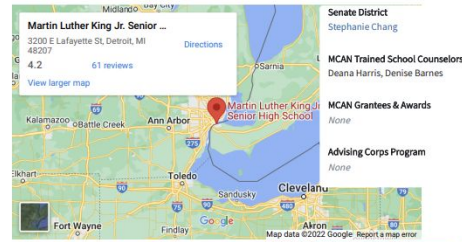

School Counselor Fellows

MCAN's School Counselor Fellows program, in partnership with San Diego State University's Center for Equity and Postsecondary Attainment, is designed as a cohort of school counselors who will be trained in advanced leadership and advocacy, specifically focused on postsecondary practices. The goal of this fellowship is to develop leadership and awareness of the counseling landscape in the state and country. (A stipend, SCECHs and travel coverage is offered)

At the end of the two-year fellowship, counselors will have created an advocacy project that can be directly applied to their school community as it relates to college access.

New Professional Development Opportunities Coming Early 2023

Equity-Focused Career Development and Postsecondary Transitions — January-May 2023

Participants will acquire the skills and knowledge needed to address equity and access issues in career development and help students prepare for postsecondary education and careers. Topics include overview of career theory; diversity, equity, and inclusion in career advising; identifying the key elements of a model career development curriculum; connecting postsecondary planning to career and workforce development goals; engaging students and families intentionally in postsecondary decisions; and maximizing students' success in the postsecondary attainment process.

Contemporary and Social Issues in School Counseling — January-May 2023

This course will review current events, ideas, opinions, and topics relevant to the school counseling profession today. Whether it be gender equality, poverty and homelessness, immigration, healthcare, critical race theory, teacher and counselor shortages, or the current COVID-19 pandemic, participants will explore how these issues impact college and career counseling, postsecondary planning, and develop plans to address the concerns in their own community.

Both courses will be facilitated by Dr. Laura Owen from the Center for Equity and Postsecondary Attainment at San Diego State University and will be submitted for SCECHs.

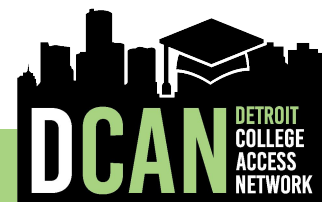

FAFSA Strategy: FSAID

FSAID

Why Does a Student Need an FSAID?

- Can not complete FAFSA without it.
- Students legal electronic signature. FSAID is also your account username and password.
- Access the Students information, processing results, to make corrections, or to renew a FAFSA form based on data the student filed previously
- Access to online information about federal student aid the student has received

Tackling the Application Process

The Breakdown

Different Segments of the Application Process

- **FSAID (October Focus/April for Juniors)**
 - Student
 - At least one parent (unless independent)
- **Completion Steps**
 - Personal Information
 - Account Information
 - Contact information
 - Communication Preferences
 - Challenge Questions
 - Confirm & Verify

The Breakdown

Common Mistakes

- Student attempts to complete FAFSA and parent didn't create FSAID.
- Parent created students FSAID. But used their personal email address instead of students.
- Student forgot their password, but did not verify their contact information.
- Student and parent went to a FAFSA night but, completed the FSAID the night before.
- Student used school email address to create FSA ID

Current Senior Class/Underclassmen

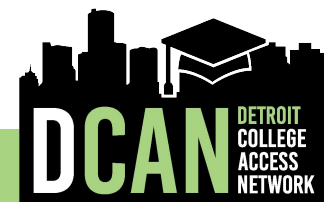
- Once the class is divided set goals of when you want to have the given group at completed status and/or shifted to a new group. (e.g. 6 groups divided up over a two week period)

- Identify 5-7 student leader to assist

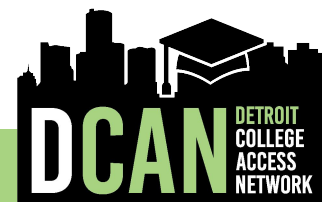

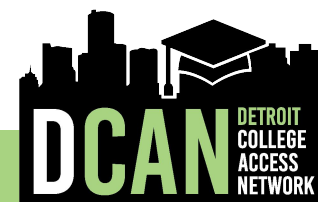
